PUBlic Professor — Remarkable Husbands and Unusual Fathers Thursday, Oct. 26, 7 to 9 p.m., Lethbridge Lodge, 320 Scenic Drive S.

Dr. Jo-Anne Fiske, a Department of Women & Gender Studies professor, will explore a different understanding of war experiences in men who fought in the First World War. Typically, veterans are portrayed as victims of shell shock or as men who never spoke of their experiences during the war. Based on her own experience as the daughter of a veteran, conversations she's had with other children of veterans and archival records, Fiske discuss how war experiences may have contributed to veterans' nurturing family relationships.
