On the Puzzling Death of the Sanctity-of-Life Argument

Abstract: The passage of time influences the content of the law and therefore also the validity of legal arguments. This is true even for charter-arguments, despite the widely held view that constitutional law is made to last. In this paper, I investigate the reason why the sanctity-of-life argument against physician assisted suicide lost its validity between the Supreme Court decision in *Rodriguez v. British Columbia* in 1993 and *Carter v. Canada* in 2015. I suggest that a rhetorical approach to argument evaluation is the best basis for a satisfying explanation.
