Students seeking to apply to the University of Lethbridge Teacher Education program who already possess an approved bachelor-level degree from a recognized university may be considered for acceptance into the program if

- the degree has a major concentration in a teaching subject area; or,
- the student acquires credit for an appropriate range of courses in a teaching subject.

The subject areas and the Education majors to which they lead are Art Education, Career and Technology Studies (CTS): Business Focus, Drama Education, English Language Arts Education, Mathematics Education, Modern Languages Education (French, German, French/ German, or French/Spanish), Music Education, Native Education, Physical Education, Science Education, and Social Studies Education. See the 2014/2015 University of Lethbridge Calendar, Part 8 - Faculty of Education, Section 5.b. (p. 162) for more information.

Normally students in the B.Ed. After Degree program are expected to present in their major the same number of courses as students in the Combined Degrees Program (see Part 13 - Combined Degrees in the 2014/2015 University of Lethbridge Calendar). Any courses required to complete the major are in addition to the minimum 20 Education courses comprising the After Degree program.

Note:Modern Language Education Majors in French, French/German, French/Spanish, and German must have in their first degree a study experience similar to French 2250, Spanish 2250, or German 2250, or equivalent, prior to graduation with an After-Degree B.Ed.

Students initially must complete a required education course, Education 2500 - Practicum I - Orientation to Teaching. For qualified applicants, admission decisions are based primarily on evaluation of performance in Education 2500, a writing proficiency requirement, and grade point average calculated on all UofL and transferable courses taken within the semesters containing the last 20 university-level courses (60.0 credit hours), including courses in a previous degree and courses taken subsequently.

Upon admission to the Faculty of Education, the student must complete four semesters of professional study. In addition to Education 2500, a minimum of 19 course equivalents, including practica, are required to graduate.

In the first year of the program, students complete Professional Semester I (PS I) (September to December) that includes on-campus modules and field experience involving observation in the classroom as well as limited teaching. In the Spring semester (January to April), students complete Professional Semester II (PS II) comprised of Education courses and extended field experience, requiring the student to assume increased responsibility in the classroom and to demonstrate a greater degree of teaching competence, especially in their major.

In the second and final year, students will complete Professional Semester III (PS III) involving intensive field experience in the form of teacher internship. Students assume total and complete responsibility in a classroom (equivalent to one-half time during the duration of the semester) and refine their skills through continued practice and reflection. This allows students to focus in Elementary Education, Secondary Education, Fine Arts (Art, Dramatic Arts, or Music) Education, Career and Technology Studies (CTS) - Trades, Career Education, Native Education, International Education, Early Childhood Education, Special/Inclusive Education, or Technology in Education.

In the remaining semester of the final year, students will typically take a total of four courses, including one Education Foundation course and three Education elective courses, to complete the necessary requirements. Students may complete these courses during the Summer Session between PS II and PS III.

Upon successful completion of the above, students graduate with a Bachelor of Education degree (B.Ed.) and are recommended by the Faculty of Education to Alberta Learning for teacher certification.

It may be possible to complete an Education minor and/or specialization in addition to the major. The Faculty of Education offers 18 minors and two specializations (Special/Inclusive Education and Technology in Education). A minor typically consists of five non-Education courses and one curriculum and instruction Education course. Native Education Majors must have a required minor comprised of seven non-Education courses in a school subject area. The specializations consist of four courses and corresponding Professional Semester III focus. Completing a minor and/or a specialization allows students to develop expertise in a second area of teaching and be more versatile and marketable as a graduating teacher. After Degree Program Sequence

Pre-Education

- An approved baccalaureate degree, which includes:
- A major in a school subject:
- A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.50 out of 4.0 calculated on all UofL and transferable courses taken within the semesters containing the last 20 university-level courses (60.0 credit hours), including courses in a previous degree and courses taken subsequently
- A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.50 on all courses comprising the major
- * Credit in Education 2500 Practicum I Orientation to Teaching (or equivalent) and a favourable recommendation
- ____ Completion of the Writing Proficiency Requirement English by the June 1 document deadline
 - Special admission requirements for majors in Drama Education, Music Education, Native Education, and Physical Education

* Students who receive a Waiver of Education 2500 or have counted Education 2500 within the minimum requirements of the approved degree will be required to complete an additional Education elective. Students who do not receive a favourable recommendation, or who have withdrawn, may be permitted to re-enrol in the course after one full year and with permission of the Assistant Dean, Student Program Services.
