About the B.F.A. (Multidisciplinary) Program The Bachelor of Fine Arts (Multidisciplinary) provides students with the flexibility to pursue studies in the Departments of Art, Theatre and Dramatic Arts, and Music in combination with courses from outside the Faculty of Fine Arts. The 10 electives, either from the Faculty of Fine Arts or other faculty, can support a student's chosen career path.

Career Opportunities

This program affords an excellent preparation for students wanting to pursue professions in fine arts fields such as art therapy, art administration, performance, journalism, musical theatre, recreation, arts criticism, or design.

Sample Sequence Plan

This Planning Guide includes a sample program that enables the completion of the degree in four years. However, if you wish to complete the degree at a more gradual pace, you may reduce the regular semester load and take elective courses in the summer or extend the program by another year.

Program Requirements

The B.F.A. (Multidisciplinary) degree requires 40 semester courses, including a minimum of 22 courses in Art, Drama, and Music.

Transfer Credit

Remember that you may use both University of Lethbridge credit and credit transferred from another college or university to meet degree and major requirements. Transfer credit may be either specified or unspecified. Specified credit is indicated on your transcript by the subject name and the specific number of the course, e.g., Drama 1000, Drama 2130, etc. Unspecified credit (1XXX, 2XXX, etc.) is indicated by the subject name and the level of the course in parentheses, e.g., Drama (1000 level), Drama (2000 level), etc.

Unspecified Course Credit

Unspecified course credit means that the University of Lethbridge does not offer the same course you transferred in, but we recognize it and treat it as a regular course. An unspecified course would meet an elective requirement in your program, but it could not meet a specific course requirement. For example if Drama 2120 is required in your program, you could not use Drama (2000 level) to fulfill that requirement. Students with unspecified transfer credit need to consult an Academic Advisor to establish how the transfer credit fits in the degree program. This should be done as soon as possible after transfer credit is awarded.
