COURSE DESCRIPTION

Medical microbiology course focuses on biology and pathogenesis of bacteria, viruses, prions, and parasites, and their threat to human and animal survival and health. In this course, students will be introduced to the basic concepts of microbiology and diverse microorganisms through medically relevant examples, as well as concepts such as infection vs disease, diagnosis, treatment, prevention, and surveillance of infectious diseases. Current topics such as antibiotic resistance and nosocomial diseases will also be reviewed in the course. This course is designed for students with little knowledge in microbiology; some background in biology will be an advantage. Moodle will be used for this course. This course will follow University Academic Policy as outlined in the 2016-2017 calendar.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course, students will be able to

- Describe diverse microorganisms that are important in medical microbiology and diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of these microorganisms.
- Understand and describe body's immune responses to microorganisms.
- Methods and strategies to control microorganisms in the environment and body.
- Better understand the current topics in microbiology such as antibiotic resistance.

Tests:

There will be three tests held during the course. Students will have an option to retake test #1 and test #2 [with different sets of questions], **if they took the first attempt**. In this case, the **higher mark** of the two attempts will be calculated for the test. The window to reattempt the tests will be announced in class. Students will not have an option to reattempt test #3. The tests will be based on the material presented or discussed in the classroom and textbook chapters that students are required to review independently. The instructor will identify the chapters and lectures that will be covered in the test. Tests will not be cumulative **but** knowledge from earlier topics will be needed to better understand the concepts/materials presented at later points in the class. Any course related materials will not be permitted during the tests. Tests will be composed of multiple choice and true/false questions.

Oral Presentation:

A list of presentation topics for the oral presentation will be provided in class. Students will be asked to work in groups to prepare and deliver an oral presentation. The presentations will be scheduled throughout the course. The presentation should not be longer than the allotted time. Marks will be deducted for presentations not finished in a timely manner. Participation in the group projects in **mandatory**. Each group member may be asked to evaluate the participation of your fellow group members to ensure that everyone has contributed to the preparation and presentation. This is meant to keep you accountable to your group members. If there is a consensus within the group that someone has not contributed, then that group member will be penalized and will receive a lower grade than the other group members.

Classroom Attendance:

Students are expected to attend all the lectures. Attendance will be tracked and graded at the end of the semester. Each student will be allotted one absence with cause from class without penalty to their attendance marks. After that, half a mark will be deducted for every missed class with the maximum of 10 marks deduction from the allotted attendance grades.

Participation:

Participation marks will be assessed based on completing **in-class quizzes** and participating **during students' presentations**. The instructor will give short quiz at the end of four lectures. There won't be any prior announcements about on which class day a quiz will be given. The quiz will be from the materials presented in the lecture the day the quiz is given. You will receive participation marks for completing the quiz [2 marks for each quiz, maximum 8 marks]. The remaining two participation marks can be earned by engaging during in-class presentations.
