Cuttings from the Tree of Knowledge: The Propagation of Creation Museums in North America

Friday, Jan. 25, 3 to 4:30 p.m., B650, University Hall

The Department of History Colloquium Series presents a talk by Dr. James Linville, a professor in the Department of Religious Studies. Linville will discuss the Young Earth Creationist movement — which holds that the universe, Earth and all life were created around 6,000 years ago — and the creation museums that have sprung up in the last few decades. Linville will examine the reasons for the genre's success and its manifestations in Canada.
