

Prerequisites

PSYC 2700 and at least one other 2000-level, 3-credit course in PSYC or NEUR.

Textbook

Available as a regular book or an E-book (through CourseSmart). The first edition is not an acceptable substitute. The course is based largely on the book, but everything on the exams is covered in lecture. Purchasing the textbook is recommended, but not mandatory.



Course structure

Lectures – On most days, David will lecture on a chapter from the textbook. He'll post the slides on Moodle before class. You should bring a copy of the PowerPoint presentation (on a computer or printed out) and take additional notes during class. The lectures will follow the book pretty closely, but they will include some material that is not in the book and omit some material that is in the book. The material in the lectures will be the basis of the exam questions. If a topic is not discussed in the lecture, it will not appear on the exam.

Exam review – Prior to review days, each student will post one question about the material. These should be questions that you want answered to help you understand the material (some students in the past have submitted exam-style questions; that's not what I'm looking for). Questions are due <u>before the start of class</u>. The instructor and TA will select questions to be answered during the review class period.

Exams

Exams will be made up of multiple-choice questions and administered in the Testing Centre. No notes of any kind are permitted, but you may use the Windows calculator program. The midterms will cover the lectures. The final will include the lectures from the last quarter of the course, as well as comprehensive questions addressing some of the most important ideas from quarters one through three. Students will not be able to access completed exams with their own accounts. If you wish to review you completed exam, you should visit office hours and the instructor or TA can open it for you on Moodle.
