Harley Hotchkiss Memorial Lecture Thursday, Sept. 26, 11:15 a.m., E690, University Hall

Dr. Richard Betzel, a neuroscience professor at Indiana University Bloomington, will discuss pathways and modules in brain networks. Advances in large-scale imaging of the brain have made it possible to reconstruct regional and anatomical pathways. These pathways can be represented as networks and analyzed using methods from network science.
