Harley Hotchkiss Memorial Lecture — Encoding and Transmitting Affective States Friday, Nov. 22, 11:15 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., SA6008, Science Commons

Dr. Jaideep Bains, a professor of physiology and pharmacology at the University of Calgary, will discuss how humans detect the emotional or affective state of others. The inability to accurately detect and respond to the emotions of others is a feature of several developmental disorders, such as autism spectrum disorder and schizophrenia. Bains' research findings suggest the detection of negative affective states in others is controlled by cells that coordinate the brain's response to stress.

Department of History Colloquium — You are on Indian Land Friday, Nov. 22, 3 to 4:30 p.m., C640, University Hall

Dr. Paul McKenzie-Jones, a U of L Indigenous Studies professor, will describe how two acts by the United States government ended freedom of movement across the U.S.-Canadian border for Indigenous people in both settler nations. McKenzie-Jones will look at the arguments Indigenous activists have used in the last 100 years to push back against the legitimacy of the Canada-U.S. border. Policing of the border intersects multiple Indigenous territories which pre-date European settlement.
