Dr. Claudia Malacrida, "Disability, Sexuality and Family - Past and Present - in Alberta"

Malacrida will discuss her research with disabled women in Alberta about sexual reproduction and social control in the current context and historically. Survivors of Alberta's eugenic period (1928-72) describe both passive and active methods used to discourage them from having relationships, becoming pregnant or having children. In some ways, these efforts continue into the present. Interviews with disabled women today illustrate similar discouragements that operate in disability services and policy.

Dr. Carly Adams, "Memory and Method in Sport and Leisure Research: Using oral histories to learn about Southern Alberta's sporting past"

Adams will discuss how oral narratives contribute to our understanding of sport, recreation and leisure experiences in Southern Alberta. Drawing on several oral history projects, Adams will focus on women's sport and leisure practices of the past and the process of meaning-making.

Dr. Jenna Bailey, "Open Doors and Silent Voices: Conducting oral history interviews with the Ivy Benson Band" Using material from over 80 oral history interviews, Bailey will discuss the lives and careers of musicians in the Ivy Benson Band, the first nationally known and longest running all girl band in British history (1940-1985). Bailey will address the historical dismissal of female popular musicians based on gender and sexuality and

explore how this impacted upon the process of oral history interviewing.

Dr. Jenna Bailey, "The Cooperative Correspondence Club 1936-1990: Researching and Writing about a Secret Women's Magazine"

Bailey will discuss the Cooperative Correspondence Club (CCC), a group of British women who produced a secret magazine for over half a century starting in the 1930s. Bailey will explore how she combined archival research and oral history interviews to reveal the story in her book, *Can Any Mother Help Me? The true story of motherhood, friendship and a secret magazine.* (Faber and Faber, 2007).
