ABOUT US



Ken MASUDA (増田 研) is Associate Professor in the School of Global Humanities and Social Sciences, and the School of Tropical Medicine and Global Health. Ph.D. in Social Anthropology (Tokyo Metropolitan University). His career as anthropologist started in an agro-pastoral ethnic group in Ethiopia, Northeast Africa. He is currently leading several research projects on population aging and social sustainability in Nagasaki, Hiroshima, and countries in East Africa.



Takenori NOGAMI (野上 建紀) is a professor in the School of Global Humanities and Social Sciences. His specialty is archaeology, and he concentrates on interactions and trade in the relatively recent period of the Medieval and Early-modern times. The research theme that interests him most is the clarification of trade routes for Hizen porcelain (Imari) exported from Nagasaki during the Edo period.



Wang Wei (王 維) is a professor of Cultural Anthropology in the School of Global Humanities and Social Sciences at Nagasaki University. She is specialized in the study of Chinese Overseas and ethnomusicology. She has continued to carry out varied field work in Japan, Asia and African countries since 1990s.



Yumiko Saito (才津 祐美子) is a professor in the School of Global Humanities and Social Sciences. Her specialty is folklore and cultural anthropology. She has been clarifying the effects of local culture transitioning into cultural heritage and becoming a tourism resource. In the future, she plans to investigate the World Heritage status of Nagasaki's churches and the implications.



Simon Hull (サイモン ハル) is an assistant professor at Nagasaki Junshin Catholic University. He holds degrees from the University of Cambridge, United Kingdom, and Harvard University, USA, and was closely involved in Japan's successful bid to list some of the Nagasaki region's Hidden Christian Sites as world heritage sites, which were inscribed on the World Heritage List by UNESCO in 2018. In 2019, he was appointed by the President of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Japan to head the International Press Centre during the visit of Pope Francis to Nagasaki. He specializes in Japanese Catholicism.

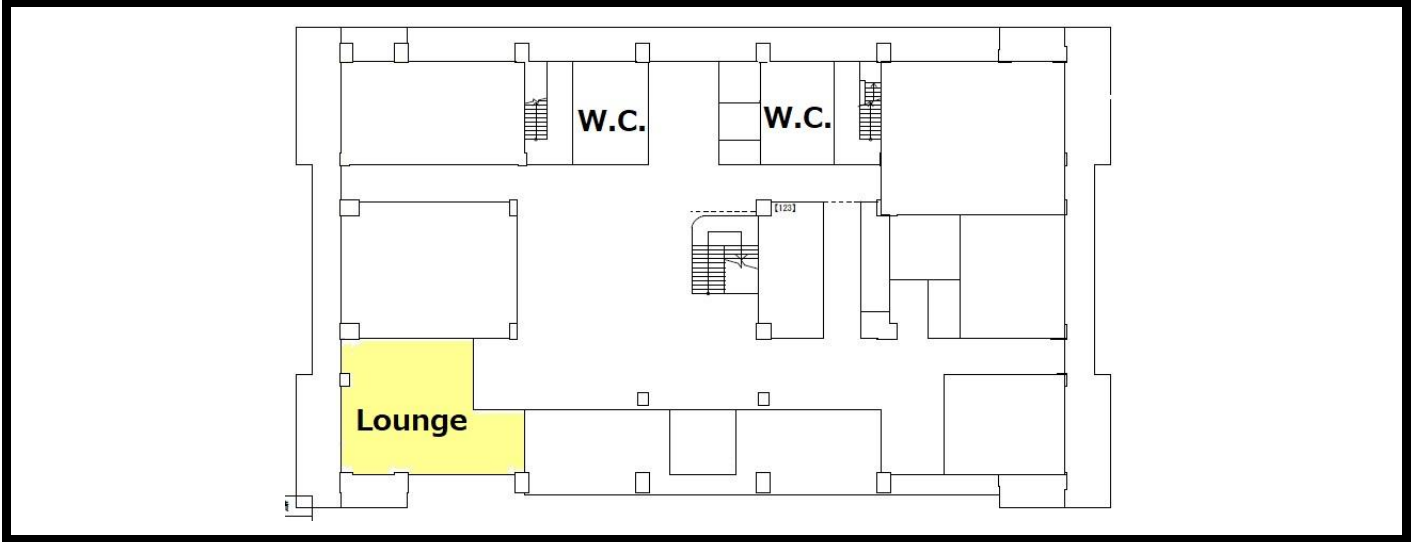

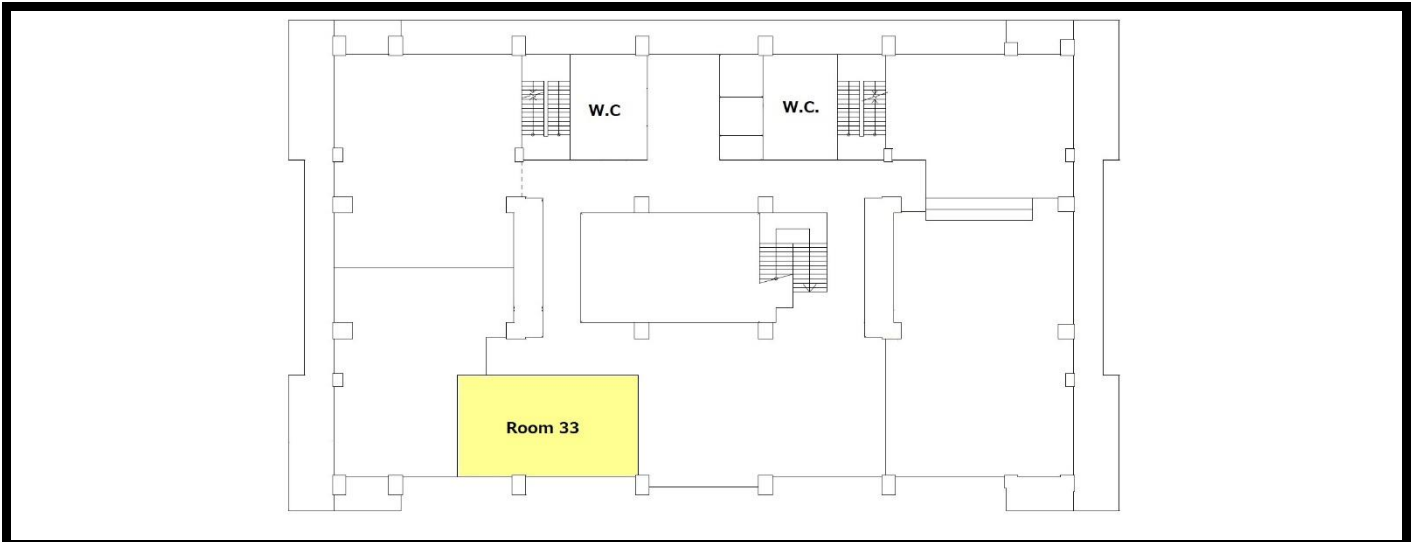
