### Director's Note

Welcome to a world where well-meaning intentions collide with the complexities of identity. This play dives into the entangled relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous characters, centering on Angel and her partner Colleen. At first glance, Colleen appears to be a supportive ally, but as she encourages Angel to focus on writing stories about growing up on the Rez, she risks turning authenticity into cultural exploitation. This is what alterNatives is trying to warn us about. An exploration of how one's desire to help can cause unintentional harm.

I discovered this play during my undergrad at a time when I was coming into my own as a theatre artist in this very room. A time where many of its topics explored in the play weren't being talked about. Eight years later, it still speaks to me. The way Angel is tethered to home, despite their desire to escape the social expectation of cultural preservation.

As Drew Hayden Taylor suggests in the setting of this play, there is no time like the present, which is why the intimate staging of this show was chosen to help strip away the veneer of misguided attempts at political correctness. With humour and heart, I want to showcase complex characters with their own messy truths and hidden agendas. No one is perfect -- that much we know is true, and over the course of the dinner party we see each character's implicit biases rise to the surface, revealing thoughts, beliefs, and opinions that aren't always easy to digest.

Audiences will notice the non-traditional casting of Angel as a woman; something that was integral for me as a Two-Spirit artist. I wanted to capture a queer story that doesn't focus on 'coming out,' but rather the beautiful dysfunction of their relationship due to their colliding ideologies. With a talented ensemble of Indigenous and non-Indigenous actors, this production promises to be witty, poignant, and most importantly -- a reflection of our times.

## BIOS For Returning Alumni Artists



Marshall Vielle (BFA '17) is from the Kainai Nation and a graduate from the University of Lethbridge with a Bachelor of Fine Arts focused on Drama Performance.

As an actor, director, writer, and drag performer, they use theatre to build a foundation of understanding and act as a pillar of support for marginalized voices, bringing creativity and passion to every project. When not on stage, Marshall advocates for equity, diversity, and inclusion, working extensively as a facilitator of gender and sexual diversity education. Marshall enjoys horror films, '60s girl groups, and the joys of nurturing their collection of plants. They are also a dedicated advocate for Two-Spirit, Queer, and Trans youth, striving to create inclusive spaces and programs. As a community program and curriculum developer, Marshall's work reflects their commitment to fostering understanding and empowering those around them. Their multifaceted approach blends artistry with social impact, making a difference in their community.

Jolane Houle (She/Her) (BFA'12) is a Calgary based artist and member of the Blood tribe. A graduate of the University of Lethbridge ('12), she holds a BFA in Technical Theatre and a diploma in Fashion Design from Lethbridge College ('07).



She has worked in several capacities of the costume department from Stitcher to Head of Wardrobe, which include: New West Theatre (Lethbridge), Stage West Theatre (Calgary), and Alberta Theatre Projects (Calgary).
