As former President of the National Association of Japanese Canadians, Art shared stories of the path to a just redress with the Canadian Government for the injustices Japanese Canadians faced in WWII. # The 2024 winner of the Michael Chan Prize in Asian Studies is Matthew

Braisher for his essay, "Nationalism, Morale, and Endurance in Various Armies from 1850-1950." Congratulations!! An MA History student under the supervision of Dr. Kristine Alexander, Matthew is working on a research-based board game on the First World War. He describes, "In this paper, I argue for the importance of nationalism in bolstering wartime morale, providing examples from 1850-1950 in the First Sino-Japanese War, Second World War, Russo-Japanese War, American Civil War, and the First World War. I conclude that while nationalism plays a major role in morale, it is a complicated concept that is influenced by many forces outside of nationalism."

Congratulations to Dr. Bonnie Lee (Faculty of Health Sciences — addictions counselling) for being selected as one of U of L's EDI Scholars for 2024-25!

Dr. Lee will launch the Student-generated Quick Cases: EDI Dilemmas from Students' Lived Experience project. This competition invites upper-level and graduate health sciences students to create "Hollywood-style" vignettes based on their personal experiences with EDI dilemmas. The goal is to generate real-life scenarios for discussion and role-play, helping students explore various perspectives and compiling a valuable resource for future educational use.

"EDI issues are more complex than meet the eye," says Lee. "It's always instructive to consider these dilemmas from the standpoints of the various actors involved. We want to understand why people take the positions they do and get a deeper sense of what they feel inside."

Bringing together an international set of participants from North America, Europe and Asia, the conference theme Health, Healing and Civilizations was inspired by Dr. Bonnie Lee from Health Sciences as the Conference Chair. The President of the Society, Lyn Rhodes, deemed this conference to be "a resounding success" with a pre-conference workshop on Indigenous Ways of Healing and a postconference visit to two UNESCO sites - Heads Smashed in Buffalo Jump. Many of our U of L colleagues contributed to a stellar set of presentations and the field trip, among them were John von Heyking, Gerlinde Metz, Sheila McManus, Jean Baptist-Leca, Gideon Fujiwara, Mark Slomp, Kevin McGeough, Shawn Bubel and Bonnie Lee. Students, past and present, also presented papers and posters, making this an exciting and truly interdisciplinary four-day event!

As a sequel to the connections formed at the conference and those interested in the issues of civilizations at this turning point in human history, the ISCSC is sponsoring the first Online Book Club series (October – March) on the book From Third World to First (2002) by Singapore founding prime minister Lee Kuan Yew. The book is a fascinating blend of history, leadership lessons, and geopolitical reflections from one of the 20th century's most influential leaders. For the past decade the **U of L has** enjoyed a special partnership with Gakushuin Women's College (GWC) in Tokyo. A pillar of our ties has been the highly innovative and popular course ASIA 2020 Japan, Asia, and the World which connects professors and students from both universities to learn from one another about our societies and cultures. At the heart of this course is GWC's Prof. Aki Kinjo, a business historian, who visited us in May to attend the ISCSC conference and to meet his U of L students and many colleagues for the first time in person. Both Aki and Gideon Fujiwara have been co-teaching this highly interactive course ASIA 2020 this term.

At the conference, Aki presented on a panel on "Japanese state reform, corporate museums and poetry as healing methods" along with Robert Bedeski (UVic), Hitomi Sano (Keio U), and Gideon Fujiwara. Yong-Chool Ha (UWashington) offered comments as discussant. We enjoyed several days of stimulating discussion and sharing laughs.

(Golden Maple cont'd) Many generations in the audience were inspired. There was applause throughout, as well as laughter at the banter between Art and Jesse. Art signed copies of his books while conversing with members from the community.

During their visit, Phil Fontaine, former National Chief of the Assembly of First Nations and his partner Kathleen Mahoney, Professor Emerita of the University of Calgary, drove down to see their good friends Art and his wife Keiko. Chief Fontaine and Prof. Mahoney led negotiations of the Indian Residential School Settlement Agreement, and they spoke of how Dr. Miki had shared insights from his experience with Redress which helped inform their negotiations on the settlement over the tragedy of the Residential Schools.

We all toured Nikka Yuko Japanese Garden and the Bunka Centre (pictured to the right).

We appreciated Consul-General of Japan Takehiko Wajima and U of L President Digvir Jayas bringing greetings, and the strong support from our campus and local communities.
