Department of Theatre and Dramatic Arts

About the Post-Diploma B.F.A. (Dramatic Arts) Program This broad, general-focus program is appropriate for students with a technical or performance diploma in Theatre or Drama. Post-Diploma students study theatre history, acting, stagecraft, and obtain hands-on, practical, experience by participating in the series of major productions presented by the Department of Theatre and Dramatic Arts.

Drama Production Credit

Drama 2600, 3600, and 4600 are courses that allow credit for participation in productions produced by the Department of Theatre and Dramatic Arts. Participation includes all aspects of the production process (acting, design, props, lighting, sound, stage management, etc.). Drama 2611, 3611, and 4611 are similar, but are limited to technical or design assignments. Registration in Drama 2611, 3611, and/or 4611 requires the prerequisite of Drama 2810.

Procedure:

- 1. The production season is established in the spring of each year. The list is available from the Chair of the Department of Theatre and Dramatic Arts.
- Students may contact the faculty member responsible for directing the play or watch the bulletin boards for notice of audition dates. Those interested in the technical aspects of the production may wish to contact the Technical Director.
- 3. Registration in the relevant course number normally occurs in the semester in which the production(s) will be completed. The usual course registration deadlines do not apply (i.e., students may register at any time during the semester without negalty).

 4. The forms required to register are available from the Fine Arts Advising Office (W660). Registration must be in person.

Drama and Education

Education 2500

Education 2500 is an introductory course that must be completed before admission to the program. Its main focus is to assist students in making a decision about the suitability of teaching as a career.

Field Experience

One of the strengths of the University of Lethbridge Education program is the extensive amount of field experience students acquire during their two years in the faculty. Beyond Education 2500, all students teach in the schools during Professional Semesters I (five weeks), II (six weeks), and III (full semester internship). Practicum placements in PS II and PS III focus on teaching Drama in a variety of classroom contexts, while PS I is a more generic placement.

Performance

Because performance is an important form of communication for Drama teachers, students are encouraged to gain as much performance experience as possible by taking advantage of all the productions presented by Department of Theatre and Dramatic Arts. Although optional, Drama 2600, 3600, and 4600 are useful courses to help students gain additional performance experience.

'Methods for Non-majors' Elective

Education students are encouraged to take at least one 'methods for non-majors' elective such as Mathematics, Language Arts, or Social Studies, before entering the Professional Semester II, and definitely before PS III.

Career Opportunities

Completing a B.F.A./B.Ed. Combined Degrees program enables graduates to teach from K to 12.

Teaching in the Practicum

During their practicum, students may teach units on orientation, improvisation, reader's theatre, story theatre, mime, movement, and scene study. Possessing experience with some or all of these subjects helps ensure success in the classroom.

Education Minors

Students may complete an Education minor in addition to the major. The Faculty of Education offers 19 minors. A minor consists of five non-Education courses (excluding those used in the major) and one curriculum and instruction Education course. Students may use the same courses to fulfill minor and General Liberal Education requirements. Completing a minor allows students to develop expertise in a second area of teaching and be more versatile and marketable as a graduating teacher. Post-Diploma B.F.A. (Dramatic Arts)/Bachelor of Education

Post-Diploma B.F.A. (Dramatic Arts)/Bacheloi	Calendar Year - 2010/2011
All students begin the program classified as Pre-Post-Diploma B.F.A. (Dramatic Arts)/ B.Ed. in the Faculty of Fine Arts. After the completion of 10 courses, including Education 2500 (or equivalent), students may apply to the Faculty of Education. Students are not officially in the 35-course Post-Diploma Combined Degrees program until they have been admitted to BOTH the Faculty of Fine Arts and the Faculty of Education. To book an appointment with a Fine Arts Student Advisor, visit www.uleth.ca/finearts/advising. Admission Requirements for the Faculty of Fine Arts include: Completion of an approved* two- or three-year college diploma in Theatre or Dramatic Arts with a GPA of 2.50. * Approved by the Dean of the Faculty of Fine Arts in consultation with representatives from the academic discipline. Approval is dependent upon the college's program containing the courses required for the first use years of the B.F.A. (Dramatic Arts). The college program must include a minimum of 16 courses in Drama. A list of approved Diploma programs is available on the Admissions website (waw.uleth.ca/ postalploma) or from the Admissions Office. Diplomas from other colleges will be considered on an individual basis. Portfolio: A collection of materials representative of recent theatre experiences as a performer, designer, technician, etc. A typical sample: a list of productions, roles, reviews. Also photographs, programs, video tape. Portfolio requirements are available at www.uleth.ca/finearts/ drama/admissions. Admission Requirements for the Faculty of Education include: Minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.50 on all Uofl. and transferable courses taken within the semesters containing the last 20 courses (60.0 credit hours). Social Science and Science courses from the diploma may be used to meet this requirement. A maximum of four courses from one department may be counted toward this requirement. (Please refer to the 2010/2011 Calendar, p. 85, for further details.) Completion of at least eight courses (24.0 credit hours) at the 3000/4000 level. A maximum of three Independent Study courses in Fine Arts. Education: Maintenance of a grade point average of 2.50 in Education courses. Completion of the Drama Education major with a grade point average of 2.50. A maximum of two Independent Study courses in Education. Residence Requirement: Completion of a minimum of 35 courses (105.0 credit hours) at the University of Lethbridge, including a minimum of eight Drama courses (24.0 credit hours) and 20 Education courses (60.0 credit hours).
