Students with an academic objective of Journalism are generally admitted to a B.A. program at the University of Lethbridge with a major of the student's choice. Majors in Economics, English, History, Political Science or Sociology may be of particular interest.

The University of Lethbridge offers courses that will qualify students for application to the School of Journalism at the University of Regina. Prospective applicants must have completed at least 20 semester courses to be considered for admission.

To be eligible for admission, students must have the following:

B.A. - Journalism

Application Information for the School of Journalism:

Competition for admission to the Bachelor of Arts in Journalism program at the University of Regina is keen. Students are cautioned that adherence to the program requirements (as indicated on the previous page) is mandatory; applications will be eliminated from consideration if any required course has not been taken.

Students may also apply for a Bachelor of Journalism. This degree is for students with any previous degree who seek to specialize in Journalism. There are no specific courses required for admission to the Bachelor of Journalism degree. The previous degree must be conferred no later than Spring Convocation of the year for which admission is sought.

The School admits a maximum of 26 students per year.

Application Procedure:

Applications to the program must be received by the University of Regina Admissions Office by **January 31** of the year in which admission is sought. As well as completing the pre-Journalism requirements, students must:

- 1. Achieve a cumulative GPA of 3.00 (B);
- 2. Pass an entrance examination testing English proficiency, critical thinking, and knowledge of current events; and,
- 3. Perform successfully in an interview before a selection board comprised of University of Regina faculty and news media representatives.

Entrance examinations and interviews are held between February and April. Applicants will be notified of the admission decision in writing.

The School of Journalism stresses the utility of a broad liberal arts base acquired during the minimum two years (60.0 credit hours) of pre-Journalism studies.

After admission to the School, students concentrate on the study and techniques of Journalism itself in a full-time, two-year (60.0 credit hour) program consisting of three terms of coursework and a four-month (one semester) internship, which every student must complete to earn the degree. Students are placed with a news media organization in western Canada and gain practical experience in the field. Completion of a practicum often leads to later employment opportunities and allows students the opportunity to gain professional experience.

The two years of Journalism studies must be completed in full at the University of Regina.

The average is calculated on the best 60.0 credit hours that fit the requirements. If a course has been repeated, only the second attempt will be considered even if that is not the better of the two. Pass/Fail courses are not included in the calculation of a student's average.

Although it is not necessary to maintain a full-time courseload during the pre-Journalism program, the Journalism program is a full-time load and you should be prepared to handle that.
