About the Religious Studies Major	Religious Studies aims to enhance critical understanding of the phenomenon of religion and the diversity of religious experience and expression from antiquity to the present in both Eastern and Western traditions. Fundamental issues such as belief, texts, worship, ritual, concepts of the divine, the human condition, and the historical development of particular religions are examined. The academic study of religion requires a measure of neutrality and distance, whereby all religious traditions are treated with similar respect and critical inquiry.

Graduate Studies	There are more than a dozen graduate schools and programs in Religious Studies across Canada, including Ph.D. programs at the University of Toronto, McMaster University, McGill University, the University of Alberta, and the University of Calgary.			
Opportunities for Graduates with Religious Studies Majors	University students in Religious Studies acquire a range of skills. Religious Studies graduates have entered such fields as teaching, journalism, counselling, human resources, law, and civil service, or have worked with religious and humanitarian organizations.			
Independent Study	The major in Religious Studies requires a minimum of one Independent Study, designed by the student in co-operation with a Religious Studies professor. This course offers the student the opportunity to address his or her particular academic interests beyond the regular curriculum. The required concepts and methods course provides the student with the scholarly tools necessary to appreciate the academic study of religion.			
Co-operative Education	A Co-op option, requiring three work terms, is available. Students interested in the Co-operative Education/Internship program should contact the Coordinator of Co-operative Education in the Career Resources Centre (B610 phone: 403-382-7154) for further information.			
Program Requirements	The B.A. degree with a major in Religious Studies requires 40 semester courses, including a minimum of 10 courses in the major (nine Religious Studies courses plus one cognate). A maximum of 20 courses in Religious Studies is allowed.			
Transfer Credit	Remember that you may use both University of Lethbridge credit and credit transferred from another college or university to meet degree and major requirements. Transfer credit may be either specified or unspecified. Specified credit is indicated on your transcript by the subject name and the specific number of the course, e.g., Religious Studies 1000, Religious Studies 2500. Unspecified credit (1XXX, 2XXX, etc.) is indicated by the subject name and level of the course in parentheses, e.g., Religious Studies (1000 level), Religious Studies (2000 level), etc.			
Unspecified Course Credit	Unspecified course credit means that the University of Lethbridge does not offer the same course you transferred in, but we recognize it and treat it as a regular course. An unspecified course would count as one of your maximum of 20 from one department, but it could not meet a specific course requirement. For example, if Religious Studies 2600 is required in your program, you could not use Religious Studies (2000 level) to fulfill that requirement. Students with unspecified transfer credit need to consult an Academic Advisor to establish how the transfer credit fits in the degree program. This should be done as soon as possible after transfer credit is awarded.			

This is a planning guide and not a graduation check or guarantee of course offerings. You should have a program check done in your final year of studies. Students are responsible for the accuracy of their own programs. The guide should be used in conjunction with the University of Lethbridge Calendar, which is the final authority on all questions regarding program requirements and academic regulations. Terms Used

GLER course: A course that could count toward the General Liberal Education Requirement. You may use courses in your major towards this 12-course requirement. See the 2010/2011 University of Lethbridge Calendar, Part 4 - Academic Regulations (p. 85) for complete information.

The Faculty of Arts and Science offers Liberal Education 1000 and 2000, specifically designed to introduce first-year students to the wide scope of human knowledge and teach essential university success skills, critical thinking, and integrative thinking (see the 2010/2011 University of Lethbridge Calendar, Part 14 -Courses, p. 306). LBED 1000 and 2000 may be used toward satisfying the GLER.

Elective: A course that you may choose freely from all those available and applicable to your program. Use courses inside or outside your major, bearing in mind any restrictions that may apply (e.g., a maximum of 20 courses from any one department).

Cognate: A course from a related discipline deemed to complement the chosen area of study and to encompass knowledge and skills essential to that area.



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
