# **Faculty of Arts and Science: General Social Sciences**

About the General Major in the Social Sciences

The General Major in the Social Sciences is designed to provide a broad major that supports the ideal of liberal education without sacrificing focus and depth unduly. Students are strongly encouraged to choose Social Science disciplines that are school subject areas or are taught in the provincial curriculum.

# **Faculty of Education**

### **Choosing an Education** Major

The Faculty of Education offers 11 different majors that correspond to teaching subjects in Alberta schools (see p. 163 in the 2011/2012 University of Lethbridge Calendar for a listing). In highly competitive teaching majors, the GPA for admission may be above the minimum requirements.

# **Choosing Courses Outside** the Major

Students sometimes find that their initial objective to teach only at the elementary level or only at the secondary school level is later modified—or even completely changed. Students are therefore encouraged to select courses that will prepare them for teaching in a variety of situations. Moreover, students should select courses that not only provide breadth and richness for the classroom but also provide the basis for the development of a teaching minor or specialization.

### **Choosing an Education** Minor

The Faculty of Education offers 19 minors (see p. 168 in the 2011/2012 University of Lethbridge Calendar for a listing). A minor consists of five non-Education courses (excluding those used in the major) and one curriculum and instruction Education course (to be completed after admission to the Faculty of Education). Students may use the same courses to fulfill the minor and the General Liberal Education Requirement (GLER).

# **Choosing an Education Specialization**

The Faculty of Education offers three specializations:

- Early Childhood Education
- Special/Inclusive Education
- Technology in Education

The specializations consist of four courses and corresponding Professional Semester III focus.

# **Advantages of Completing** a Minor and/or **Specialization**

Completing a minor and/or a specialization allows students to develop expertise in a second area of teaching and be more versatile and marketable as a graduating teacher. The guide should be used in conjunction with the University of Lethbridge Calendar, which is the final authority on all questions regarding program requirements and academic regulations. Contact an Academic Advisor in the Faculty of Arts and Science or Faculty of Education for advising information.

#### **Program Requirements**

The B.A./B.Ed. Combined Degrees program with a General Major in the Social Sciences/Social Studies Education requires 50 courses, including 30 Arts and Science courses and 20 Education courses. Courses for the General Major in the Social Sciences will be chosen from three separate disciplinary streams or subject areas. Sixteen courses are required in the major.

### **Disciplinary Streams**

You are required to do seven courses in your first disciplinary stream, which must be a school subject in Social Studies: Anthropology, Economics, Geography, History, Political Science, and Sociology. An additional four courses are required in each of your remaining disciplinary streams. You may choose from Archaeology, Kinesiology/Physical Education, Native American Studies, Psychology, and Women's Studies, but you should understand that the more school subjects related to Social Studies that you include in your General major, the better prepared you will be to teach. Your 16th course will be a 'Quantitatively-based Methodology' course (statistics).

#### **Transfer Credit**

Remember that you may use both University of Lethbridge credit and credit transferred from another college or university to meet degree and major requirements. Transfer credit may be either specified or unspecified. Specified credit is indicated on your transcript by the subject name and the specific number of the course, e.g., Political Science 1000, Geography 2600. Unspecified credit (1XXX, 2XXX, etc.) is indicated by the subject name and the level of the course in parentheses, e.g., Political Science (1000 level), Geography (2000 level).

#### **Unspecified Course Credit**

Unspecified course credit means that the University of Lethbridge does not offer the same course you transferred in, but we recognize it and treat it as a regular course. An unspecified course would count as one of your maximum of 17 courses from one department, but it could not meet a specific course requirement. For example, if Economics 2900 is required in your program, you could not use Economics (2000 level) to fulfill that requirement. Students with unspecified transfer credit need to consult an Academic Advisor to establish how the transfer credit fits in the degree program. This should be done as soon as possible after transfer credit is awarded.
