Department of Art

Courses

As part of the required core courses, students will be introduced to art studio areas in a Visual Foundations course and must take studio courses in drawing and computer art. Students will also take courses in art history/museum studies, and further studio areas including drawing, painting, sculpture, printmaking, photo-arts, video, installation art, or audio art. Studio courses will culminate with Advanced Studio and Senior Studio courses. These six-credit-hour Art Studio courses are arranged in concentrated time slots (two five-hour blocks per week) to ensure uninterrupted creative activity.

Portfolio Requirements

Students applying for the B.F.A. (Art)/B.Ed. must submit a portfolio. Portfolio requirements can be found on p. 180 of the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar and at www.uleth.ca/finearts/departments/art/admissions.

UofL Art Collection

All Art students benefit from first-hand examination of original artworks in the University of Lethbridge Art Collection. One of the most impressive collections of any educational institution in Canada, it includes artwork representing several movements from Canada, America, and Europe spanning the 19th and 20th centuries, and continues to grow with 21st century additions.

Visiting Artist Program

The Visiting Speakers in the Arts Program offered through Art Now and Architecture and Design Now, provides extensive exposure to leading practitioners in the field. With several high-profile visitors every week—including artists, critics, historians, and curators—students have a unique learning experience, one that illuminates national and international achievement.

Faculty of Education

Art and Education

Success in Art and Education has similar requirements including commitment, organization, creativity, and persistence.

Education 2500

Education 2500 is an introductory course that must be completed before admission to the program. Its main focus is to assist students in making a decision about the suitability of teaching as a career.

Field Experience

One of the strengths of the University of Lethbridge Education program is the extensive amount of field experience students acquire during their two years in the faculty. Beyond Education 2500, all students teach in the schools during Professional Semesters I (five weeks), II (six weeks), and III (full semester internship). Practicum placements in PS II and PS III focus on teaching art in a variety of classroom contexts, while PS I is a more generic placement.

Studio Practice

Students will experience many different aspects of studio practice ranging from integrating Art across the curriculum from Kindergarten through Grade 12, to teaching Art as a separate discipline. Therefore, it is recommended that students develop strong studio art skills prior to admission to the faculty.

'Methods for Nonmajors' Elective

Education students are encouraged to take at least one 'methods for non-majors' elective such as Mathematics, Language Arts, or Social Studies after admission to the Faculty of Education and before entering Professional Semester II, and definitely before PS III.

Students are responsible for the accuracy of their own programs. Career Opportunities

Completing a B.F.A./B.Ed. or B.A./B.Ed. Combined Degrees program enables graduates to teach from K to 12. However, the B.F.A./B.Ed. program better equips graduates to teach Grades 7-12, and is especially valuable for teaching Grades 10-12.

Teaching in the Practicum

During their practicum, Art students commonly teach units on painting, ceramics, drawing, and computers, as well as another subject such as Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, or Language Arts. Therefore, students must be strong and confident in the area of Art to integrate it with other subjects.

Education Minors

Students may complete an Education minor in addition to the major. The Faculty of Education offers 19 minors. A minor consists of five non-Education courses (excluding those used in the major) and one curriculum and instruction Education course (to be completed after admission to the Faculty of Education). Students may use the same courses to fulfill minor and General Liberal Education requirements. Completing a minor allows students to develop expertise in a second area of teaching and be more versatile and marketable as a graduating teacher. Program Requirements

The B.F.A. (Art)/B.Ed. Combined Degrees program requires a minimum of 50 semester courses, including 30 in Fine Arts (and Arts and Science) and 20 in Education. A minimum of 22 Art and/or Art History/Museum Studies courses (66.0 credit hours) with a grade point average of at least 2.00 is required. Students begin this program in the Faculty of Fine Arts where they progress toward completion of Fine Arts degree requirements, and prepare to meet the admission requirements for the Faculty of Education. Students admitted to the Faculty of Fine Arts may declare their intention of completing the combined B.F.A. (Art)/B.Ed. degrees. Such students who have not yet been admitted to the Faculty of Education are designated pre-B.F.A. (Art)/B.Ed. After completion of the minimum number of courses required to be eligible for admission to the Faculty of Education, students may apply and, if accepted, be formally enrolled in the B.F.A. (Art)/B.Ed. Combined Degrees program. Students are not officially in the program until they have been admitted to BOTH the Faculty of Fine Arts (through admission to the University) and the Faculty of Education.

Transfer Credit

Remember that you may use both University of Lethbridge credit and credit transferred from another college or university to meet degree and major requirements. Transfer credit may be either specified or unspecified. Specified credit is indicated on your transcript by the subject name and the specific number of the course, e.g., Art History/Museum Studies 1000, Art History/Museum Studies 2225, etc. Unspecified credit (1XXX, 2XXX, etc.) is indicated by the subject name and the level of the course in parentheses, e.g., Art History/Museum Studies (1000 level), Art History/Museum Studies (2000 level), etc.

Unspecified Course Credit

Unspecified course credit means that the University of Lethbridge does not offer the same course you transferred in, but we recognize it and treat it as a regular course. An unspecified course would meet an elective requirement in your program, but it could not meet a specific course requirement. For example, if Art History/Museum Studies 2225 is required in your program, you could not use Art History/Museum Studies (2000 level) to fulfill that requirement. Students with unspecified transfer credit need to consult an Academic Advisor to establish how the transfer credit fits in the degree program. This should be done as soon as possible after transfer credit is awarded.

Admission to the Faculty of Education

Completion of a minimum of 20 semester courses (60.0 credit hours).
 Minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.50 on all UofL and transferable courses taken within the semesters containing the last 20 courses (60.0 credit hours).
 Completion of a minimum of eight courses (24.0 credit hours) in Art and/or Art History/Museum Studies, including all transferable courses, with a minimum cumulative average of 2.50.
 $Credit\ in\ Education\ 2500\ -\ Practicum\ I\ -\ Orientation\ to\ Teaching\ (or\ equivalent)\ including\ a\ favourable\ recommendation\ from\ the\ instructor.$
 Demonstrated proficiency in written and oral English by the June 1 document deadline. A student may meet the Writing Proficiency

- obtaining a grade of 75 percent or higher on the English Language Arts 30-1 Alberta Diploma exam
- obtaining a final grade of 80 percent or higher in English Language Arts 30-1 or its equivalent from any province
- passing the Alberta Universities' Writing Competence Test (AUWCT)
- · obtaining a pass in the 'Writing for University' course
- obtaining a grade of 'B' (3.00 on a 4.0 scale) or higher in Writing 1000
- obtaining a grade of 'B' (3.00 on a 4.0 scale) or higher in a university English course
- successful completion of a recognized degree from an English-language university

Students are encouraged to consult early with the Faculty of Education, Student Program Services Office regarding procedures for meeting the Writing Proficiency Requirement.
