Applicants must submit to the Department of Music a digital portfolio that includes three parts:

1. Essay

A minimum 600-word essay in PDF or Word format that describes the following: (1) reasons for choosing this program, (2) area of interest in the Digital Audio Arts (production, film, broadcast, composition and or computer music), (3) all audio and technology experiences in the area, (4) music theory background, and (5) any other information the applicant deems relevant.

2. Audio Examples

Applicants must submit 3 to 5 audio examples. Submissions may or may not be original compositions. Submissions of audio for film or other visual media in QuickTime and other digital imagery are also acceptable.

3. Inventory List

Applicants will include an inventory list of the examples including the title and date of each work, names of collaborators, and a description of the process used (including hardware and software). The list must also include the applicant's name and contact information.

Portfolio Deadline: All materials must be received by the University by June 15 for admission to the Fall semester.

Note: Portfolios must be submitted by March 1 to be considered for early admission. June 15 is the final date portfolios are accepted for the Fall semester.

Program Requirements

The B.Mus. degree requires 40 semester courses, including a minimum of 22 Music courses (66.0 credit hours) for Digital Audio Arts majors.

Music Theory

On the day before the first day of classes, students write a general rudiments skills test for Music 2160 (Theory I). Students who achieve 'good standing' on this exam are placed in a section of Theory I that meets three times a week (i.e. Monday/Wednesday/Friday). Students who fail to achieve 'good standing' are placed in a second section of the course that meets five times a week (i.e. Monday/Tuesday/Wednesday/Thursday/Friday), enabling deficiencies to be remedied by the end of the semester.

Music Studio

Students majoring in Digital Audio Arts may choose Music Studio courses as electives, available in piano, voice, strings, guitar, woodwinds, brass, percussion, and composition. To register in your first semester of studio, you must successfully complete an audition. Students must achieve a minimum grade of 'C' in each studio class to continue to the next level.

Transfer Credit

Remember that you may use both University of Lethbridge credit and credit transferred from another college or university to meet degree and major requirements. Transfer credit may be either specified or unspecified. Specified credit is indicated on your transcript by the subject name and the specific number of the course, e.g., Music 1000, Music 2160, etc. Unspecified credit (1XXX, 2XXX, etc.) is indicated by the subject name and the level of the course in parentheses, e.g., Music (1000 level), Music (2000 level), etc.

Unspecified Course Credit

Unspecified course credit means that the University of Lethbridge does not offer the same course you transferred in, but we recognize it and treat it as a regular course. An unspecified course would meet an elective requirement in your program, but it could not meet a specific course requirement. For example if Music 2160 is required in your program, you could not use Music (2000 level) to fulfill that requirement. Students with unspecified transfer credit need to consult an Academic Advisor to establish how the transfer credit fits in the degree program. This should be done as soon as possible after transfer credit is awarded.

This is a planning guide and not a graduation check or guarantee of course offerings. You should have a program check done in your final year of studies. Students are responsible for the accuracy of their own programs. The guide should be used in conjunction with the University of Lethbridge Calendar, which is the final authority on all questions regarding program requirements and academic regulations. Studio Audition Procedure

(Note: Studio courses are optional in the Digital Audio Arts major)

An audition is required to ascertain the applicant's abilities, musical development, overall musicianship, and potential.

Audition Dates	<p>Fall Semester: Instrumental and vocal auditions for the Fall semester are held in March and May. Although a live audition is preferred, it is possible to send a videotape/DVD, which must be received by June 15.</p> <p>Spring (January) Semester: Instrumental and vocal auditions are on the last day of classes in December. Although a live audition is preferred, it is possible to send a videotape/DVD, which must be received by November 15.</p> <p>Note: <i>Some Entrance Scholarships are available based on live auditions and completing the appropriate scholarship application form by the deadline. (Early Entrance - March 1; Others - June 1).</i></p> <p>Audition dates and more audition information is available at www.uleth.ca/finearts/departments/music/studio-audition-information.</p>
Audition Application	Applications are available at www.uleth.ca/finearts/departments/music/application-studio-course-audition .
Audition Accompaniment	Instrumental and vocal auditions must be accompanied unless the piece is written as an unaccompanied solo. Applicants are encouraged to supply the accompanist. If that is not possible, please call 403-329-2495 at least two weeks prior to the scheduled audition.
Composition	<p>Students who want an emphasis in composition must:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. successfully complete an instrumental or vocal audition at the entry level for Music 2148 - Studio I - (Instrument), and 2. successfully complete a composition audition.
Studio Instructors	Requests for a specific studio instructor should be made at the time of the audition. Every effort will be made to accommodate the request, but final assignment of instructors rests with the Department of Music.
Late Auditions	Late auditions will be granted under extenuating circumstances, but admission to Studio classes is not guaranteed after the audition deadline.

Studio Audition Requirements

<i>Guitar</i>	Two contrasting pieces (one may be an étude) that demonstrate range, technique, and expressive qualities of the instrument. Royal Conservatory Grade VII or higher.
<i>Woodwinds</i>	Two contrasting pieces (one may be an étude) that demonstrate range, technique, and expressive qualities of the instrument. Scales may be required. Royal Conservatory Grade VIII or higher.
<i>Brass</i>	Two contrasting pieces (one may be an étude) that demonstrate range, technique, and expressive qualities of the instrument. Scales may be required.
<i>Percussion</i>	One solo or étude on three of the following: mallet, snare drum, timpani, drum set, and multiple percussion. Major scales and sight reading of a melodic line in both clefs are required.
<i>Piano</i>	One work by J.S. Bach and one contrasting piece. Royal Conservatory Grade VIII or higher. Memorization strongly encouraged.
<i>Strings</i>	Two contrasting pieces (one may be an étude) that demonstrate range, technique, and expressive qualities of the instrument. Scales may be required. Royal Conservatory Grade VIII or higher.
<i>Voice</i>	<p>Prospective students are required to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Vocalize to various vowels to assess range and evenness of scale. • Sing back various ear exercises. • Demonstrate rhythmic acuity by clapping rhythms supplied (actual score). • Perform, from memory, three contrasting classical selections, two of which must be in a language other than the student's native tongue. Repertoire may include operetta/light opera selections (e.g., Strauss, Lehar, Romberg, Gilbert and Sullivan).
<i>Composition</i>	Portfolio that best represents the applicant's current level of compositional ability.
