Faculty of Education

Career Opportunities

Completing a B.Mus./B.Ed. or B.A. (Music)/B.Ed. Combined Degrees program enables graduates to teach from Kindergarten to Grade 12. However, careful consideration should be given to the choice of combined degree options. The B.Mus./B.Ed. provides the strongest background in music. Individuals planning a career as a music specialist (i.e., teaching primarily music) at either the elementary or the secondary levels should pursue this route. Students considering a more generalist career (e.g., grade 4 classroom teacher) should consider the B.A./B.Ed. We advise students planning to teach music at the secondary level to take Education 3872, 3875, and 3876. Students planning to teach at the elementary level should take Education 3871 and 3877 plus a Fine Arts Education elective.

Education 2500

Education 2500 is an introductory course that must be completed before admission to the program. Its main focus is to assist students in making a decision about the suitability of teaching as a career.

Field Experience

One of the strengths of the University of Lethbridge Education program is the extensive amount of field experience students acquire during their two years in the faculty. Beyond Education 2500, all students teach in the schools during Professional Semesters I (five weeks), II (six weeks), and III (full semester internship). Practicum placements in PS II and PS III focus on teaching Music in a variety of classroom contexts, while PS I is a more generic placement.

Strong Musical Skills

All music majors, regardless of degree combination, must demonstrate strong musical skills. Therefore, students should gain as much musical experience as possible prior to applying to the Faculty—performing in university and/or community ensembles, taking the maximum studio courses, and so forth. Volunteer activities or work experience related to teaching (not necessarily only music) also strengthens a potential candidate's application to the Faculty as well as his or her teaching performance after admission.

Piano Proficiency

Basic piano proficiency is also a requirement for the successful completion of Professional Semester II.

Note: *Individuals without piano training can meet this requirement through participation in weekly piano lab sessions and considerable practice.*

Education Minors

Students may complete an Education minor in addition to the major. The Faculty of Education offers 18 minors. A minor consists of five non-Education courses (excluding those used in the major) and one curriculum and instruction Education course (to be completed after admission to the Faculty of Education). Students may use the same courses to fulfill minor and General Liberal Education requirements. Completing a minor allows students to develop expertise in a second area of teaching and be more versatile and marketable as a graduating teacher. Department of Music

Music Theory

On the day before the first day of classes, students write a general rudiments skills test for Music 2160 (Theory I). Students who achieve 'good standing' on this exam are placed in a section of Theory I that meets three times a week (i.e. Monday/Wednesday/Friday). Students who fail to achieve 'good standing' are placed in a second section of the course that meets five times a week (i.e. Monday/Tuesday/Wednesday/Thursday/Friday), enabling deficiencies to be remedied by the end of the semester.

Music Studio

First-year B.Mus./B.Ed. students must take Music Studio during their first semester or else make up for each lost semester by extending the total length of their degree program.

Studio Audition Procedure

An audition is required to ascertain the applicant's abilities, musical development, overall musicianship, and potential.

Audition Dates

Fall Semester: Instrumental and vocal auditions for the fall semester are held in February and March. Although a live audition is highly preferred, it is possible to submit an audition video to SlideRoom (ulethbridge.slideroom.com) by the deadline of June 15.

Spring (January) Semester: Instrumental and vocal auditions are held within the last two weeks of November only if space is available. Although a live audition is highly preferred, it is possible to submit an audition video to SlideRoom (ulethbridge.slideroom.com) by the deadline of November 15..

Note: *Some Entrance Scholarships are available based on live auditions and completing the appropriate scholarship application form by the deadline. (Early Entrance - March 1; Others - June 1).*

This is a planning guide and not a graduation check or guarantee of course offerings. You should have a program check done in your final year of studies. Students are responsible for the accuracy of their own programs. The guide should be used in conjunction with the University of Lethbridge Calendar, which is the final authority on all questions regarding program requirements and academic regulations. Audition Accompaniment

Instrumental and vocal auditions must be accompanied unless the piece is written as an unaccompanied solo. Applicants are encouraged to supply the accompanist. If that is not possible, please call 403-329-2495 at least two weeks prior to the scheduled audition.

Studio Instructors

Requests for a specific studio instructor should be made at the time of the audition. Every effort will be made to accommodate the request, but final assignment of instructors rests with the Department of Music.

Late Auditions

Late auditions will be granted under extenuating circumstances, but admission to Studio classes is not guaranteed after the audition deadline.

Studio Audition Requirements

<i>Guitar</i>	Two contrasting pieces (one may be an étude) that demonstrate range, technique, and expressive qualities of the instrument. Royal Conservatory Grade VII or higher.
<i>Woodwinds</i>	Two contrasting pieces (one may be an étude) that demonstrate range, technique, and expressive qualities of the instrument. Scales and sight reading may be required. Royal Conservatory Grade VIII or higher.
<i>Brass</i>	Two contrasting pieces (one may be an étude) that demonstrate range, technique, and expressive qualities of the instrument. Scales and sight reading may be required.
<i>Percussion</i>	One solo or étude on three of the following: mallet, snare drum, timpani, drum set, and multiple percussion. Major scales and sight reading of a melodic line in both clefs are required.
<i>Piano</i>	One work by J.S. Bach and one contrasting piece. Royal Conservatory Grade VIII or higher. Memorization strongly encouraged.
<i>Strings</i>	Two contrasting pieces (one may be an étude) that demonstrate range, technique, and expressive qualities of the instrument. Scales may be required. Royal Conservatory Grade VIII or higher.
<i>Voice</i>	Prospective students are required to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Demonstrate rhythmic acuity and sight singing skills by clapping and singing short passages (supplied at audition). • Perform, from memory, three contrasting classical selections, two of which must be in a language other than the student's native tongue. Repertoire may include one operetta/light opera selection (i.e. Strauss, Lehar, Romberg, Gilbert and Sullivan). • Prepare an assigned Quick Study and perform it to the best of their ability (preferably from memory). The Quick Study (song) will be e-mailed to the applicant four days in advance of the live audition.
<i>Composition</i>	Portfolio that best represents the applicant's current level of compositional ability.

Program Requirements

The B.Mus./B.Ed. Combined Degrees program requires a minimum of 52 semester courses, including 32 in Fine Arts (and Arts and Science) and 20 in Education. A minimum of 24 Music courses (72.0 credit hours including Music Ensemble Activities) is required. Students begin this program in the Faculty of Fine Arts where they progress toward completion of Fine Arts degree requirements, and prepare to meet the admission requirements for the Faculty of Education. Students admitted to the Faculty of Fine Arts may declare their intention of completing the combined B.Mus./B.Ed. degrees. Such students who have not yet been admitted to the Faculty of Education are designated pre-B.Mus./B.Ed. After completion of the minimum number of courses required to be eligible for admission to the Faculty of Education, students may apply and, if accepted, be formally enrolled in the B.Mus./B.Ed. Combined Degrees program. Students are not officially in the program until they have been admitted to BOTH the Faculty of Fine Arts (through admission to the University) and the Faculty of Education.

Transfer Credit

Remember that you may use both University of Lethbridge credit and credit transferred from another college or university to meet degree and major requirements. Transfer credit may be either specified or unspecified. Specified credit is indicated on your transcript by the subject name and the specific number of the course, e.g., Music 1000, Music 2180, etc. Unspecified credit (1XXX, 2XXX, etc.) is indicated by the subject name and the level of the course in parentheses, e.g., Music (1000 level), Music (2000 level), etc.

Unspecified Course Credit

Unspecified course credit means that the University of Lethbridge does not offer the same course you transferred in, but we recognize it and treat it as a regular course. An unspecified course would meet an elective requirement in your program, but it could not meet a specific course requirement. For example, if Music 2180 is required in your program, you could not use Music (2000 level) to fulfill that requirement. Students with unspecified transfer credit need to consult an Academic Advisor to establish how the transfer credit fits in the degree program. This should be done as soon as possible after transfer credit is awarded.

Admission to the Faculty of Education

- _____ Completion of a minimum of 20 semester courses (60.0 credit hours).
- _____ Minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.50 on all U of L and transferable courses taken within the semesters containing the last 20 courses (60.0 credit hours). All courses must be graded with the exception of Education 2500.
- _____ Completion of a minimum of eight courses (24.0 credit hours) in Music and/or Music Ensemble Activities, including all transferable courses, with a minimum cumulative average of 2.50.
- _____ Credit in Education 2500 - Practicum I - Orientation to Teaching (or equivalent) including a favourable recommendation from the instructor.
- _____ Completion of an acceptable audition and/or interview.
- _____ Demonstrated proficiency in written and oral English by the decision document deadline (see **Part 1 - Admission, p. 29**). Applicants may meet the Writing Proficiency Requirement in any of the following ways:
 - obtaining a grade of 75 percent or higher on the English Language Arts 30-1 Alberta Diploma exam
 - obtaining a final grade of 80 percent or higher in English Language Arts 30-1 or its equivalent from any province
 - obtaining a grade of 'B' (3.00 on a 4.00 scale) or higher in Writing 1000
 - obtaining a grade of 'B' (3.00 on a 4.00 scale) or higher in a university English course
 - successful completion of a recognized degree from an English-language university
