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Students with an academic objective of Journalism are generally admitted to a B.A. program at the University of Lethbridge with a major of the student's choice. Majors in Economics, English, History, Political Science or Sociology may be of particular interest.

The University of Lethbridge offers courses that will qualify students for the Bachelor of Arts in Journalism at the University of Regina. Prospective applicants must have completed at least 20 term courses to be considered for admission. Alternatively, students may be admitted to the Bachelor of Journalism degree program following completion of a degree at the University of Lethbridge.

**Academic Requirements for Admission**

The B.A. in Journalism requires at least two years of specific university courses with a minimum academic average of 70%. All courses must be completed by April 30 of the year in which admission is sought. Pre-Journalism requirements:

**Application Information for the School of Journalism**

Competition for admission to the Bachelor of Arts in Journalism program at the University of Regina is keen. Students are cautioned that adherence to the program requirements (as indicated on the previous page) is mandatory; applications will be eliminated from consideration if any required course has not been taken. Students may also apply to the Bachelor of Journalism degree program after completion of a first degree.

The School admits a maximum of 26 students per year.

The average is calculated on the best 60.0 credit hours that fit the requirements. If a course has been repeated, only the second attempt will be considered even if that is not the better of the two. Pass/Fail courses are not included in the calculation of a student's average.

Although it is not necessary to maintain a full-time courseload during the pre-Journalism program, the Journalism program is a full-time load and you should be prepared to handle that.
